The Homeland Security program

is designed to prepare students for careers with organizations that help prevent threats and manage emergency situations. Graduates emerge ready to contribute to making the world a safer place through a curriculum that includes:

- **Introduction to Homeland Security:** Students will review the tenets of relevant initiatives, programs, policies and agencies associated with the nation's defense and security enterprise.
- **Combating Terrorism:** Students explore types of terror, the groups, individuals and governments involved in terrorism, plus terrorist methodologies, motivations, and philosophies.
- **Field Experience:** Students work with an agency or organization whose mission is relevant to homeland security, emergency management, law enforcement, crisis management, safety and security, or other related fields.

- Marian has the **only** Homeland Security Program in the state.
- Students are able to **minor** in forensic sciences, criminal justice, and/or psychology to broaden learning.
- Marian offers opportunities for **offsite tours and trips** related to Homeland Security.

- All classes taught by current and retired **practitioners in the field**.
